

evidence:

experiences and reasoning that bear on the truth of a belief



Shipping Truth & Evidence

Imagine a shipowner who has evidence that his ship needs extensive AND expensive repairs. But the owner does not want to pay up! Through wishful thinking, the ship owner convinces himself of what he want to believe, i.e., on the next journey everything wi





Is the shipowner "entitled" to his belief?

Is there "blame" here as the belief formed was contrary to the evidence present?

By extension, are we all obliged to believe only upon evidence?

Beliefs as Public Resources

Clifford asserted that our belief "are not for ourselves but for humanity"



Since we share knowledge and beliefs through the so-called epistemic commons, false and unjustified beliefs are a kind of pollution.



Dumping false and unjustified beliefs into our collective beliefs, argued Clifford, is as immoral as dumping toxic waste and polluting in general...
