



Ethics vs. Morals

The Main Difference, the Roles, & A Possible Joined Value

We're here to set the record straight on the difference between ethics and morals

Ethics is the **normative** search for the optimal standards informing "right" and "wrong" behaviors. Note that it is not necessarily the case that a culture is the sole determiner of "right" and "wrong!"

When we use the phrase morals, or, "my morals," on the other hand, we are typically referring to a **descriptive** rendering that sketches our behaviors as a reflection of our understanding of "right" and "wrong."



Ethics

The systematizing, defending, and recommending of concepts of right and wrong behavior, i.e. **how ought we to act**



My Morals

What are my personal opinions concerning right and wrong behavior, i.e. **how do I act**

1 Ethics is based on extensive research, academic discourse, and refinement.

Ethical theory & discourse is long-term and reflects analysis that extends beyond first-person, whereas "my morals" is by definition subjective .



Ethical theories CAN change and evolve, but these changes are typically over decades and the result of meticulous research

It is tempting to view a personal framing of "right" and "wrong" as **the** basis for both ethical theory and morality (many moral philosophers take this position) but it is one of many possible positions!

Ethics & Morality can work together.
